The Month of Sacred Celebrations

“Our institute is consecrated to Christ, the Lord and teacher, receiving from Him continuous proofs of assistance and blessing,” (Cons. 11)

The loving contemplation of the Heart of Jesus encompasses all the mysteries of Christ's life, understood under the light and love that come from His Heart. In “The Month of Fervor” (1884), St. Louis Guanella writes “We will reflect on the Sacred Heart in his relation to the mystery of the Incarnation, Birth, Life, Passion and Death of the Savior, as well as to his glorious Resurrection and Ascension into heaven.” In contemplating the Mysteries of Christ, a soul opens to an atmosphere of wonderful familiarity with the Lord: “Consider what a good heart of a Father is the Heart of Jesus the Savior; know that you are pleasing Him; you are making Him happy; you are experiencing happiness; you open the house of your heart to Him.”

In the “Internal Regulations of the Sons of the Sacred Heart”, Father Guanella reminds that “the Divine Heart of Jesus Christ is Patron, Custodian, Master and Lord of the House since its beginnings”. With trust and gratitude, he affirms that his charitable works were born, developed and growing because of the Sacred Heart: “Let us give thanks to the Sacred Heart of Jesus for his assistance and blessings toward our Institute. Our charitable Houses are flowing out from the great Heart of God. It is He who is sustaining them and makes them flourish.”

This devotion is expressed and nourished by the cult in his honor, first and foremost in the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass and in Holy Communion. To Father Guanella, “the Eucharist is the Sacred Heart of Jesus. In the Tabernacle the Eucharistic Heart is truly and substantially present, and with the Heart his Blood, his Holy Face, the adorable Person of our Redeemer and Lord Jesus Christ.” For that reason, “our chapel is our Paradise on earth, and the Heart of Jesus adored in the chapel is the joy of our heart.” This year, the month of June is rich with sacred celebrations as the liturgy includes the Solemnity of Pentecost (June 8), the Most Holy Trinity (June 15), Corpus Christi (June 22), and the Solemnity of Saints Peter and Paul (June 29). Following the Solemnity of Pentecost, the Church begins her

slow descent from the great peaks of the Easter Season to the verdant pastures of Ordinary Time, the longest of the liturgical seasons. She pauses briefly to praise the Holy Trinity - Creator, Redeemer, and Sanctifier- and then the Sacrament of the Body and Blood of Christ, Corpus Christi.

Therefore, the close of the Easter season marks not the cessation but rather the beginning of Ordinary Time which is the commencement of the Church's activity which also coincides with the beginning of the academic year in India and our mission in the new places where we are sent. This is the hour to "go out to all the world and tell the good news." The sacred celebrations of June highlight this expansion of the Church and the expansion of our heart, where we serve. At least ten times, the Church vests in the red of the martyrs (The Ten Primitive Persecutions) whose blood is the very seed of her growth, including the feasts of the Apostles Peter and Paul. This reminds us that we, too, are called to be witnesses like the apostles and martyrs. May the Heart of Jesus inflame our hearts so that we may be worthy of our Baptismal and consecrated call to holiness. Sacred Heart of Jesus, have mercy on us. Immaculate Heart of Mary, pray for us.

We're thrilled to announce the celebration of our Jubilee Year, as directed by the General Council! Join us on June 21, 2025, at Annai Vailankanni Shrine, Besant Nagar, Chennai, India, as one united family. We invite all communities - SdC, DSMP, GC, GLM, beneficiaries, and well-wishers - to arrange, participate and make this occasion unforgettable. Let's come together to rejoice and give thanks for our Guanellian heritage!

Introduction

The **Guanellian Charism School for the year 2025** was organized from May 1st, 2025 Thursday to May 3rd, 2025 Saturday at Bangalore. **The first-of-its-kind** made the possibility to include and bring together all the three Guanellian families (*Servants of Charity, Daughters of St. Mary of Providence and the Guanellian Co-operators*) as proposed by the General Chapter. All the three days events were well coordinated and emceed **by Fr. Arun Kumar SdC**, the secretary to the Provincial Superior along with the GPN community Fathers and the Aged People, BCN community sisters and the good children. During these days of togetherness and fellowship all of us were able to deepen the understanding of the **Founder, Charism, Vision, Spirit, Mission and wealth of the congregations**. The interventions among the three families extended a greater and touching bond with one another as family members. All extended assisting hands to achieve the expected outcome and belong to one another in love and service. The following is the synopsis of the three days sessions.

TAMIL BOOK RELEASE ON OUR FOUNDER

On this remarkable day, Don Guanella Communication Centre published **"MALAYILIRUNDHU PURAPPATTA ANDU NADHI,"** a Tamil book about the lives of our founder St. Louis Guanella written by Mr. Rona Albert of Chennai. The book was launched by Rev. Fr. Gnanaraj SdC the Provincial Superior of Divine Providence Province and received by Rev. Fr. Ronald SdC former Provincial Superior of Divine Providence Province and Rev. Sr. Savariyammal one of the council members of the delegation of Mary Most Holy of the Assumption and Mr. Dominic one of the world councils' treasurers of the Guanellian cooperators. Followingly a Tamil song was released in memory of our Indian deceased confreres Rev. Fr. Dhanasekar and Rev. Fr. Bala SdC and Rev. Fr. Bosco SdC.

In the first session, **Rev. Fr. Ronald** delved into the essence of **Guanellian identity as exemplified by the**





young priest, Fr. Guanella. He began by noting that while no child is a perfect copy of their parents, traits and values undeniably resonate across generations. Fr. Guanella embodied this notion, showcasing a unique blend of contentment and resilience. He was known for his unwavering commitment to helping others, describing himself as a **"fiery sword"** in service to those around him.

Living closely among the people, he readily embraced the **"smell of the sheep,"** an expression that signifies a deep connection with his flock. His dedication was remarkable, as he broke the Word of God three times a day, which is the evidence of his fervent spiritual commitment. Beyond preaching, Fr. Guanella served as a teacher, always adapting his work to align with the specific needs of the communities he engaged with. His mission extended to promoting vocations for the priesthood, nurturing future leaders of faith.

Fr. Guanella's legacy is further enriched by his **humility and obedience.** A prolific writer, he shared insights and teachings that continue to inspire many today. His simple yet profound lifestyle serves as a guiding light, urging us all to incorporate these values into our own lives. Ultimately, Fr. Ronald's reflections on Fr. Guanella remind us of the importance of living authentically and dedicatedly in service to others. Life gives a lot of pain so that we may build a strong foundation tomorrow.

The second session was led by **Rev. Sr. Jeyamalini**, who spoke on the theme **"Consecrated Life and Ministerial Joy – as viewed from the Guanellian Prism."** She highlighted the distinction between **mission and ministry.** **Mission**, she said, is our personal and profound experience of God, while **Ministry** is the outward expression of that inner



experience. Through ministry, the encounter with God becomes visible and fruitful in the service of others. Sr. Malini emphasized that we are called to live a holy and simple life, rooted in the example of Christ and the teachings of St. Guanella. This simplicity is a sign of joy and authenticity in consecrated life.



Drawing from 'Vita Consecrata', consecrated persons are reminded that their witness must be joyful, showing the world that following Christ is both meaningful and fulfilling. The document also underlines the prophetic nature of consecrated life in today's world. Sr. Malini's session encouraged all to find joy not only in their personal relationship with God but also in serving others through humble and dedicated ministry.

The second day of the **Guanellian Charism School** was begun with the opening prayer by the eminent resource person **Rev. Fr. Jayapalan Sdb** who shared profound insights and reflections on the theme **"Midlife Pearls and Pitfalls of Religious Life"** with the Fathers, Sisters and brothers.

In his homily he emphasized on moving from **"murmuring moments to multiplying miracles"** which beautifully captured the essence of religious consecration. Beginning with the significant figure our master Jesus Christ he indicated that the religious life is beautiful but not easy to live and highlighted that being a sign is more crucial than merely performing services, urging everyone to align with God's plans, referring to **Jeremiah 29:11**. Delving into the Guanellian Charism and Mission, rooted in St. Luigi Guanella's dedication to the poor and marginalized, provided a strong foundation. **The four pillars of the charism** as he



shared are *Love for the poor, Trust in Divine Providence, Family Spirit, and Education and Formation* and **the mission's focus** on *service, education, community building, and spiritual growth* portray a vivid picture of the Guanellian way of life. The core values of *compassion, humility, generosity, and trust* further illuminate the **Guanellian spirit**. Some of the indications were made on the pearls of Guanellian consecrated life: ***Deepened Spirituality, Wisdom and Experience, Stronger Relationships and Greater Empathy*** alongside the pitfalls like ***Complacency, Isolation, Crisis of Faith, Spiritual Dryness, Burnout, Health Issues and Adapting to Change***. Thereafter he posed the challenges that are crucial and specific to Guanellian Priests and Sisters: *serving the poor and marginalised, collaboration with the laypeople, embracing the Guanellian Charism*.

Through the sessions he strengthened and guided by sharing about how to navigate midlife with the support of ***ongoing formation, community support, spiritual direction, self-care, accepting change, maintaining a sense of purpose and practicing gratitude***.

Finally addressing about the **present dangers and consequences of clericalism** in the synodal context, he emphasized the importance of ***walking together with the laity, listening and dialoguing with them and to have a shared responsibility*** in decision making and ***empowering the marginalized***.

Fr. Jayapalan SDB in the first session delivered an inspiring talk on the “**14 Habits of Highly Effective Guanellian Families**,” focusing on deepening spiritual life and living out Catholic values in everyday life. He emphasized the importance of being a holy person from within - grounded in personal prayer, the Word of God, and constant battle against sin. A strong love for the Eucharistic Jesus was highlighted, along with daily Eucharistic adoration. Fr. Jayapalan urged families to go “**Back to the Roots**” by understanding the vision and charism of their founder and embodying faith through action. He stressed *mutual respect, exhibiting the fruits of the Holy Spirit (Galatians 5:22), and maintaining joy within the community*.



Promoting sacraments among the youth, being vigilant in vocation promotion, and being fearless servants of God were also key points.

Additional habits included fostering joy and transparency in family life, devotion to Mother Mary and the saints, and promoting strong Catholic family values. Finally, he called on everyone to be ready to sacrifice for Christ's suffering, living a truly committed Christian life.



Thereafter **Fr. Gnanaraj the Provincial Superior** began the second session and stressed the importance of coming together as one family *to enrich and encourage* one another through *our presence and way of life*. He invited all to countercheck whether this feel is present in all our communities or wherever we Guanellians are situated. He made a humble note on the primary aim of the members is sanctification of self and others or leading a holy life, other than this interest leads/reveals a problem. Then the forum was left open for the evaluation where the Guanellian family members felt grateful for joining and learning together these days. This truly inspired and encouraged everyone to know more of the congregation, charism and mission. With a few observations and appreciations the three days charism school came to an end with the provision of umbrella as a souvenir to the participants. At the end, all gathered to invoke God's blessings and graces upon the new project for the Blessed Clare Bosatta Special School which was blessed by Fr. Gnanaraj SdC, the Provincial Superior.





ENTRANCE IN TO THE NOVITIATE



The Guanella Preethi Nivas (GPN) community was filled with joy as they welcomed Postulant Jenish into the School of Holiness on the evening of May 30th. During Vespers, presided over by Rev. Fr. Gnanaraj, SdC, the Provincial Superior of the Divine Providence Province, and in the presence of Rev. Fr. Visuvasam and Rev. Fr. Peter Joseph, the Provincial Councilors, along with priestly confreres from various communities, DSMP Sisters, and residents of the Guanella Aged Home, Postulant Jenish entered into the Novitiate by solemnly reading the Act of Consecration.

May 31st marked another remarkable day in the history of Guanella Preethi Nivas, as four novices Nov. Selvaraj Arputha Rayar, Nov. Daram Manohar, Nov. Moshappa Joseph Goudar, and Nov. The Holy Mass was presided over by Rev. Fr. R. Gnanaraj, SdC, the Provincial Superior, and concelebrated by Rev. Fr. Visuvasam, Rev. Fr. Francis, Rev. Fr. Peter Joseph (Provincial Councilors), and Rev. Fr. Mathias, the Superior of the community, along with other Guanellian Fathers and priests from neighbouring communities. More than 50 religious from surrounding congregations joyfully participated, together with the family members of the newly professed, DSMP Sisters led by Rev.
