CLERGY & PARTY POLITICS



Dear Confreres!

Social media has become one of the fastest platforms to get to know what is happening in the world and it also provides for everyone to express their views, preferences, and evaluation of what is going on around us. As religious and priests we are indeed concerned about politics especially when the elections are imminent. We all indeed look for the kingdom values realized in our times and the people at the periphery may take a step forward in their social life. Most of our work and mission is centered in this sphere as part of our evangelization. At times we see that some of us, priests and religious get involved so much in party politics to the extent of expressing and lobbying for parties in social media or enrolling as members of a political party. It is also the season of the election both in USA and in India. Therefore, I wanted also to share with you the stand of the Catholic Church concerning the participation of religious and clerics in active politics. Particularly, I want to specify Canon 285§3 to explain in detail.

The 1983 code rules definitively without qualification, "Clerics are forbidden to hold public offices that call for the exercise of civil power." First, the term clerics in the 1983 code refers to the people of God who by the sacred orders participate in the priesthood of Christ. They act in the name of Christ by their ordination. They are consecrated and deputed to divine worship and pastoral service of the brethren and are part of the hierarchy of the church. The clerics include only the deacons, priests, and bishops. This canon is about a universal law, so it imposes an obligation on all the priests of the Latin Church both secular and religious whatever may be the personal and social circumstances in which they live and exercise their ministry. The law speaks of 'assuming' office, which includes both election and appointment to office. Members of religious institutes (c.672) and of societies of apostolic life (c.739) are also bound by this canon. The 1981 *Relatio* (Written Report

of the Commission for the Revision of the Code of Canon Law) interpreted 'civil power' to include legislative, administrative, and judicial authority. The canon is concerned with the exercise of public authority. The prohibition extends beyond serving as governor, mayor, judge, senator, and the like to serve on zoning boards, school boards, transportation commissions, and similar bodies. However, merely advisory positions would not be banned. The question arises, therefore, whether or not the diocesan bishop may dispense from the law forbidding clerics to hold public office. The earlier draft of this paragraph that replaces c.139§4 of the 1917 code was more complex than the present one. The former code had foreseen the possibility of the clerics assuming public office by obtaining permission from the competent authority. The present code does not explicitly provide for such exceptions.

The motu proprio De Episcoporum Muneribus of Pope Paul VI (1966) specifically reserved to the Holy See any dispensation permitting clerics 'to assume public offices which involve the exercise of lay jurisdiction or administration,' but this reservation is not found in the present code. In the 1977 draft (c.146, §2) there was a provision for the local ordinary to give permission for a cleric to hold such office, but this proviso was ultimately eliminated. Furthermore, the prohibition was strengthened in the final version by the use of the term vetantur instead of the subjunctive verb ne assumant. Canon 1042, §2 makes the holding of a public office an impediment to ordination until the office is relinquished and an account rendered according to civil law.

According to Canon 87, §1 the bishop may dispense from universal disciplinary laws as often as he judges it helpful for the spiritual good of the faithful and when the matter has not been reserved to the Apostolic See. However, the church's position on priests and religious serving in public office would urge a bishop to use great caution in evaluating the "just and reasonable cause" required for a dispensation as demanded by can.90.

In addition to the moral content of this canon, it gives shape also to a true norm of imperative law which goes beyond simple advice or recommendation. The violation of the norm in this canon may give rise to penal sanctions through the singular precept as per can. 1399 if the specific gravity of the offense requires it and if the scandals are to prevented or repaired. In accord with the canon law, the priest who engaged in politics could of course renounce his political activity and seek to return to the Church as a priest in ministry by requesting the lifting of his suspension. The implication of this canon plainly addresses that even though there is nothing intrinsically wrong with working in politics, it is nevertheless not appropriate work for Catholic clerics. It is notable that though the permanent deacons are also included in the state of 'clerics' they are exempted acc. to can. 288.

I hope that everyone would agree that since the clergy are men of the church, their engagement in politics could cause confusion regarding the religious mission of the Church. Lumen Gentium carefully distinguished the roles of the laity and the clergy. It mentions as, "To be secular is the special characteristic of the laity. Although those in holy orders may sometimes be engaged in secular activities or even practice a secular profession, yet by



reason of their particular vocation they are principally and expressly ordained to the sacred ministry. It is the special vocation of the laity to seek the kingdom of God by engaging in temporal affairs and directing them according to God's will."

The 1971 synod of bishops also mentions that the priest, who is the witness of things to come, must keep a certain distance from any political office or involvement because values of the gospel are absolute and independent of culture but politics is rooted in the concrete circumstances of the here and now. The priest must remain a valid sign of unity and be able to preach the Gospel in its entirety. If a priest sides himself in the active politics, he would become a cause of division among the faithful. I strongly believe that it is true in real life events.

From the start of his papacy, Pope John Paul II strictly reasserted the canon law banning priests from any active participation in party politics. His intention was not to weaken Catholicism's political impact but to unify the church and to strengthen its moral authority. He wanted the singular political authority of the Vatican which must be unaltered by local politics. The authors who have written on the topic after the promulgation of the CIC of 1983 have not hesitated to relate the strong words of Pope John Paul II on the presence of the clergy and religious in the political and public life of civil society. In one of his first speeches as Roman Pontiff, in January 1979 he said: "You are spiritual leaders who must concern yourselves with leading the hearts of the faithful;. You are priests and religious; you are not social or political leaders or officials of temporal power. For this reason I repeat to you: "Let us not be under the illusion that we are serving the Gospel if we 'dilute' our charism through an exaggerated interest in the wide field of temporal problems. Do not forget that temporal power can easily be a source of division, while the priest must be a sign and agent of unity and brotherhood. Secular functions are the specific field of action of the laity, who has the task of improving temporal matters with the Christian spirit."

The words of Pope John Paul II pointed out both the specific role and function of the clerics as guides and instruments of unity in the ecclesiastical community. This distinction of the roles of clerics and laity is clear in the words of the Catechism of the Catholic Church, as "It is not the role of the Pastors of the Church to intervene directly in the political structuring and organization of social life. This task is part of the vocation of the lay faithful, acting on their initiative with their fellow citizens." Pope John Paul II said in a general audience in July 1993 titled as "Priests Do Not Have a Political Mission" that Jesus never wanted to be involved in a political movement and fled away from every attempt to draw him into earthly questions and affairs (Jn 6:15). The kingdom he came to establish does not belong to this world (Jn 18:36). For this reason he said to those who wanted him to take a stand regarding the civil power: "Give to Caesar what belongs to Caesar and to God what belongs to God" (Mt 22:21). He repeatedly told the clergy to remember their role and to look to Jesus's example: "Like Jesus, a priest must renounce involvement in political activity, especially by not taking sides, which almost inevitably happens."



Though the Code of Canon Law strictly prohibits priests from having an active role in political parties, it does not mean that they cannot have an active role in political life. They can vote but they are not to speak publicly or to support any political candidate. Moreover, it would not be a prudent act of a cleric and it could even constitute a violation of the right to freedom of the faithful in secular affairs (can.227) to openly campaign for some candidates. The lay faithful remain entirely free in these cases and they are not even morally bound to the choices of the clerics. The clerics may undertake non-partisan types of political activity in involving like defending the human rights, the promotion of the full development of the persons and their pursuit of justice and peace. They can involve themselves such activities that does not require of holding public office that calls for the exercise of civil power.

Here, I would like to conclude with the words of Pope John Paul II from Ecclesia in Oceania that states as, "It is certain that commitment to social justice and peace is an integral part of the Church's mission in the world. Yet her mission does not depend upon political power. The Church is concerned with the temporal aspects of the common good because they are ordered to the sovereign Good, our ultimate end."

Being a politician and being a priest are fundamentally incompatible.

Justice

Dear brothers and sisters, Happy Easter!

Here we are at the second of the cardinal virtues: today we will talk about **Justice**. It is the quintessential social virtue. The Catechism of the Catholic Church defines it as "the moral virtue that consists in the constant and firm will to give their due to God and neighbour" (no. 1807). This is justice. Often, when justice is mentioned, the motto that represents it is also quoted: "unicuique suum" — that is, "to each his own". It is the virtue of law, that seeks to regulate relations between people equitably.

It is represented allegorically by the scales, because it aims to "even the score" between people, especially when they risk being distorted by some imbalance. Its purpose is that everyone in society be treated in accordance with the dignity proper to them. But the ancient masters had already taught that in order for this to occur, other virtuous attitudes are also necessary, such as benevolence, respect, gratitude, affability, and honesty: virtues that contribute to a good coexistence between people. Justice is a virtue for the good coexistence of people. We all understand that justice is fundamental for peaceful coexistence in society: a world without laws respecting rights would be a world in which it is impossible to live; it would resemble a jungle. Without justice, there is no peace. Without justice, there is no peace. Indeed, if justice is not respected, conflicts arise. Without justice, the law of the prevalence of the strong over the weak becomes entrenched, and this is not just.

But justice is a virtue that acts on both a large and small scale. It has to do not only with the courtroom, but also with the ethics that characterize our daily lives. It establishes sincere relations with others: it realizes the precept of the Gospel, according to which Christian speech is "simply 'Yes' or 'No'; anything more than this comes from evil" (Mt 5:37). Half-truths, double-talk intended to deceive one's neighbour, the reticence that conceals true intentions, are not attitudes in keeping with justice. The righteous person is upright, simple and straightforward. He does not wear masks, he presents himself for what he is and he speaks the truth. The words "thank you" are often on his lips. He knows that no matter how generous we strive to be, we always remain indebted to our neighbour. If we love, it is also because we were loved first.

In tradition we can find countless descriptions of the righteous person. Let us look at some of them. The righteous person reveres laws and respects them, knowing that they constitute a barrier protecting the defenceless from the tyranny of the powerful. The righteous person does not only think of his own individual well-being, but desires the good of society as a whole. Therefore, he does not give in to the temptation to think only of himself and of taking care of his own affairs, however legitimate they may be, as if they were the only thing that exists in the world. The virtue of



justice makes it clear — and places this need in the heart — that there can be no true good for oneself if there is not also the good of all.

Therefore, the righteous person keeps watch over his own behaviour, so that it is not harmful to others. If he makes a mistake, he apologizes. The righteous man always apologizes. In some situations, he goes so far as to sacrifice a personal good to make it available to the community. He desires an orderly society, where people give lustre to the office they hold, and not the office that gives lustre to people. He abhors special treatments and does not trade favours. He loves responsibility and is exemplary in promoting legality. That [legality] indeed, is the path of justice, the antidote to corruption: how important it is to educate people, especially the young, in the culture of legality! It is the way to prevent the cancer of corruption and to eradicate crime, pulling the rug from under its feet. Furthermore, the righteous person shuns harmful behaviour such as slander, perjury, fraud, usury, mockery and dishonesty. The righteous person keeps his word, returns what he has borrowed, pays fair wages to all labourers: a man who does not pay fair wages to workers is not just, he is unjust. He is careful not to make reckless judgments of his neighbours, and defends the reputation and good name of others.

None of us knows if the righteous people in our world are numerous or if they are as rare as precious pearls. But they are people who draw grace and blessings both upon themselves and upon the world in which they live. They are not losers compared to those who are "cunning and shrewd", for, as Scripture says, "He who pursues righteousness and kindness will find life and honour" (Pr 21:21). The righteous are not moralists who don the robe of the censor, but upright people who "hunger and thirst for righteousness" (Mt 5:6), dreamers who yearn in their hearts for universal brotherhood. And, today especially, we are all in great need of this dream. We need to be righteous men and women, and this will make us happy.
