My dear Confreres!

The Christmas spirit is upon us once again. It is the season that rekindles within our hearts the great mystery of Christ's incarnation. St. Augustine of Hippo quoted: 'The Divine became flesh so that we, who are flesh may become divine'.

We have begun with the season of Advent in which we are invited to prepare for the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ, not just in Bethlehem but most especially, in the manager of our soul. We are called to re-examine ourselves and make our hearts, though as unworthy as the cave of Bethlehem, a place of consolation or the Christ Child.

The season of Advent teaches us that it is not just about our preparations for the coming glorious celebration. As Guanellian religious, we are called to be life-givers in which, conformed to the Paschal Mystery of Christ, we learn to assume and share the feelings of the other as Christ did in his Incarnation and Baptism. Like Jesus, we must have a heart that listens and understand.

In baptism we are conformed in Christ, sharing a common priesthood with him. And in the profession of vows, we are more perfectly conformed in Christ, not only through the evangelical counsels but through the mission that we are supposed to undertake. Because of God's loving mercy, heaven cannot hold Him anymore and he left behind His throne as king and quietly comes into the world that is sleeping. It comes to us as a challenge to step out from our comfort zones and be witnesses to the ends of the earth, to every culture and nation, of his loving mercy and compassion It is well and fitting that we end the celebration of Christmas with the baptism of Jesus. Because through His baptism, He was given a mission that we too are mandated to follow in His memory. My dear brothers, let us not remain around the manger happily gazing the lovely mystery. Let us challenge ourselves to leave the manger empty and go out of the cave of Bethlehem to the hill of Calvary until we witness the empty tomb. Let us go with the shepherds and kings who, after contemplating the Christ Child, left the stable, proclaiming to the world what they had witnessed.

Let me greet you during this very season of Advent a blessed preparation for the gift of Christ. Empty yourselves and be filled with God, the Emmanuel, and the God who is with us! My blessed greetings also of the Merriest Christmas to all our communities, to your families, to your loved ones and your friends. May all of us be blessed!

Dear brothers and sisters!

All of us, as the Apostle Paul would say, hold the treasure of life in earthen vessels (cf. 2 Cor 4:7). The International Day of Persons with Disabilities invites us to recognize that our frailty in no way obscures "the light of the Gospel of the glory of Christ", but instead reveals that "its extraordinary power belongs to God and does not come from us" (2 Cor 4:4,7). Everyone, apart from any merit or distinction, has received the Gospel in its entirety and, with this, the joyful task of proclaiming it. "All of us are called to offer others an explicit witness to the saving love of the Lord, who despite our imperfections offers us his closeness, his word and his strength, and gives meaning to our lives" (Evangelii Gaudium, 121). Sharing the Gospel, in fact, is not a duty entrusted only to some, but an absolute necessity for all those who have encountered Jesus and enjoyed his friendship.

Trust in the Lord, the experience of his tender love and the comfort of his companionship, are not the privilege of a few, or the prerogative only of those who have received a lengthy and thorough formation. Rather, his mercy makes itself known in a particular way to those who, instead of trusting in themselves, feel called to abandon themselves to the Lord and to empathize with their brothers and sisters. This brings with it a wisdom that gradually increases our awareness of our limits and allows us to appreciate all the more God's loving decision to help us in our weakness. An awareness that frees us from sorrow and lament — even for good reason — and opens our hearts to praise. The joy that radiates from those who encounter Jesus and entrust their lives to him is no illusion or the fruit of naiveté; it is the power of his resurrection penetrating lives marked by fragility.

Truly, we can speak of a magisterium of fragility that, if heeded, would make our society more humane and fraternal, enabling all of us to understand that happiness is bread that is not eaten alone. How much would a better awareness of our need for one another help us to have less hostile relationships

with those around us! And how much would the realization that entire peoples cannot save themselves prompt us to seek solutions to the senseless conflicts we are experiencing!

On this Day, we want to be mindful of the sufferings of all those women and men with disabilities who live in the midst of war, or have been themselves disabled as a result of warfare. How many people — in Ukraine and in other theatres of war — remain imprisoned by ongoing conflicts, without the possibility of escape? They need to be given special attention and their access to humanitarian aid facilitated in every possible way.

This magisterium of fragility is a charism by which you — dear sisters and brothers with disabilities — can enrich the Church. Your presence "may help transform the actual situations in which we live, making them more human and more welcoming. Without vulnerability, without limits, without obstacles to overcome, there would be no true humanity". [2] For this reason, I am pleased that the synodal journey is proving a favourable occasion to listen at last to your voices, and that an echo of your participation can be found in the preparatory document for the continental stage of the Synod. There we read that: "Numerous reports point to the lack of appropriate structures and ways of accompanying persons with disabilities, and call for new ways of welcoming their contribution and promoting their participation: in spite of its own teachings, the Church is in danger of imitating the way society casts them aside. The forms of discrimination listed — the lack of listening, the violation of the right to choose where and with whom to live, the denial of the sacraments, the accusation of witchcraft, abuse — and others, describe the culture of rejection towards persons with disabilities. They do not arise by chance, but have in common the same root: the idea that the lives of persons with disabilities are worth less than others". [3]

The Synod, above all by its invitation to journey together and to listen to one another, can help us understand how in the Church—also with regard to the disabled—there can be no us and them, but a single us, with Jesus Christ at the centre, where each person brings his or her own gifts and limitations. This awareness, founded on the fact that we are all part of the same vulnerable humanity assumed and sanctified by Christ, eliminates arbitrary distinctions and opens the door to the participation of each baptized member in the life of the Church. What is more, in those places where the Synod has been truly inclusive, it has permitted us to dispel deep-rooted prejudices. Encounter and fraternity break down the walls of misunderstanding and overcome discrimination; this is why I trust that every Christian community will be open to the presence of our brothers and sisters with disabilities, and ensure that they are always welcomed and fully included.

We come to realize that we exist as an us and not a them whenever disability, whether temporary or due to natural aging, affects ourselves or someone for whom we care. Then we begin to look at reality with new eyes and we see the need to break down even those barriers that at first seemed insignificant. Nothing, however, can detract from our certainty that no disability — temporary, acquired or permanent — can change the fact that we are all children of the one Father and enjoy the same dignity. The Lord loves us all with the same tender, fatherly and

unconditional love. Dear brothers and sisters, I thank you for the initiatives taking place on this International Day of Persons with Disabilities, and I accompany them with my prayers. I bless you all from my heart and ask you, please, to pray for me.

DPP FORMATORS' MEET 2023



The Divine Providence Province organized the two days meet of the formators on November 28th & 29th, 2023 at Don Guanella Major Seminary. On the first day, Fr. Praveen Jeba Kumar presented the synthesis of the formators gathering and the revising of the Ratio Formationis which took place in Rome from 3rd to 15th September. He presented the talks of five resource persons namely The Superior General Very Rev. Fr. Umberto Brugnoni SdC, who highlighted the significance of formation and the assimilation of feelings of being formed individually into the Heart of Christ. Fr. Gustavo De Bonis SdC mentioned the Decree of Promulgation of the RATIO as the normative text for the Servants of Charity. Fr. Alessandro SdC who dealt with the framework of reference and the central themes were to Educate, Form and Accompany in the process of maturation of self and the theory of Self-Transcendent consistency. Then he moved on to share about the mediation network, convergent plurality of dimensions and levels with regard to Human, Spiritual and Charismatic which was dealt by Fr. Nico Rutigliano SdC in a detailed manner. Finally he shared about the Pedagogical Dynamisms detailed by Fr. Juan Manuel SdC on 5 types of present day formators and their pedagogy and also he stressed on the importance given to the guidelines for the protection of minors and vulnerable.

On the second day, Fr. Benson shareD the theme Priestly Formation in the Digital Age which was dealt in the ARMS meet. The presentation was on the traits and characteristics of generations introduced to the digital age and the progression till date (Gen X – Gen Z), the present day challenges in seminary formation of a digital age candidate in different aspects of knowing, leading, organizing, guiding and ordering him in the formative journey. After that Fr. Shantham was invited by Fr. Provincial Superior to share the synthesis of Formators Animation at Don Bosco Renewal Centre. He shared about the basic principles of formation, vocation, discernment and model for evaluation. During the two days meet, there were discussions and clarifications on the challenges faced in today's context of formation style and mode in all the formation

houses. In between the sharing and discussions and clarification moments Fr. Provincial Superior shared a few of his concerns on formation. Finally Fr. Provincial thanked for all the efforts taken by every formator and suggested to follow the set of principles proposed in Ratio and Formation Directory.

VOCATION COORDINATORS MEET - 2023





Divine Providence Province organized a Vocation Coordinators' meeting on November 17, 2023, at Don Guanella Major Seminary, Chennai. The Vocation Coordinators from each community and the students of Theology and philosophy participated in the event.

The meeting started with invoking God's presence in a prayer service followed by a welcoming address. Fr. Jeyaseelan, the Vocation Promoter, shared updates regarding the Vocation Promotion endeavors carried out in various places. He shared that there are 20 candidates in the minor Seminary for the "Come and See" program. These individuals are good and capable of realizing their vocations, which is evident in their sense of conviction. Fr. Jeynaseelan next thanked every confrere for the timely help they provided towards the smooth functioning of the office. He said he frequently visits schools, boarding schools, and parishes to recruit additional vocations.

After his sharing, Fr. Provincial addressed the participants, remarking that our vocation is by the grace of God and is a God-given gift. We are happy for the gift of our families, though our parents and siblings are different in character. We love them because they belong to us and vice-versa. We are fathers and brothers. We are not common people. We are called by God. We chose this state in life because of the love of our congregation, which gives us our identity. We are called by someone after joining the Seminary. We came to know and love our congregation and recommend that others join. It is necessary to be well-versed to share the specifics about it with others. Even though we have our difficulties, we always have the desire and the heart to appreciate our congregation and institution. We also must show our closeness towards youth to inspire and encourage them. Let them come and see, live, and make mistakes. Slowly, their motivation will be purified, and they will become stronger in their vocation. Since we are a service-oriented organization, we need to attract people who want to reach out to help

others or at least have the potential to do this. Fr. Provincial recommended that we promote vocations.

Our confreres also presented their future plans to promote vocations. A proposal was raised, and a discussion was held on how to encourage the Boys' Home students. We

need to help the boys discern their vocations if they have one. The brothers made a request to involve them in vocation camps organized by the province. Everyone has shown their interest in joining together to get vocations for our congregation.

In the end, Fr. Provincial thanked all the participants for their availability and their attitude of risk-taking to promote vocations. The meeting ended with the recitation of the Lord's Prayer.


INTERSCHOOL SPORTS MEET - 2023
